


H.A.N.D.S. MISSION STATEMENT

H.A.N.D.S. Questionnaire: Responses in Brief

147 members (40 of whom have partners who are also members) were interviewed between June 2004 and July 2005. This is a brief summary of the 16-page file. Please let Murray or Joanna know if you'd like to have a look at it, by email or in hard copy, in its very detailed entirety.

Q: What services or goods do you need from HANDS members?

A: Most often named: food (94, mainly veges, fruit & eggs); seedlings & plants (31); work— gardening (39), work on home and land (about 90), a variety of other skills (49, with many wanting car mechanics, chainsaw work & firewood, sewing, and haircutting); tuition of various sorts (25, with 8 for computer tuition); massage (18) and other healing therapies (22); markets (18).

Q: If you have children under 18, would you like them to have a sub-account from your account?

A: Of 50, yes: 21, no: 23, maybe: 6 (N/A 97)

Q: What is your experience with HANDS? Or do you have a story to share?

A: Markets are good. Tendency to use more when a new member. Good social system. Frustrations getting what one needs due to unavailability of members, members needing cash, can't use for petrol, living expenses, etc. Tendency to like and support it in principle even when not using it. Appreciation of receiving things that would not have been possible otherwise.

Q: When was your last trade?

A: Anywhere from today, recently (significant) to the last market (significant), a few months ago (significant), to a long time ago (significant) and everything in between.

Q: How often do you trade? (not asked of everyone)

A: Anywhere from every few days to hardly ever – no amount significant.

Q: Do HANDS fulfil your needs?

A: It's helpful, up to a point, depending on each member's situation.

Q: What do you expect from HANDS? What would you expect from HANDS in an ideal sense?

A: Generally, ability to use more. Samples of frequently expressed views: that it works as designed—to keep things circulating in GB without money and make things easier financially; willingness of members to trade, members available, variety of offerings, quality offerings, easy to trade both ways, broader, more people, more active, not just an alternative—fill more of our basic everyday needs; friendlier and more integrity than conventional system; taken seriously, more integrated into community, food, tradespeople, and real merchants participating; need to keep it going especially if there's a crash, healthy model, that it will grow & succeed, good will, people to believe in it, transparency, fairness.

Q: Do you have any suggestions for the newsletter?

A: Mostly complements for the newsletter – it's enjoyed and read with interest. Suggestions for layout ranged from simpler to more jazzy, and there was a variety of one-off suggestions for content and distribution.

Q: Do you have any suggestions for improving the HANDS system? ITALICS

A: Suggestions are grouped by topic:

What people would like to be available on HANDS: tradespeople, shops, businesses, food and other necessities, Organic Shop, more people and more choice
Markets: more markets (12), combine with Takaka weekly market (4), Collingwood market (4), several other suggestions about markets.

HANDS Shop: Suggested by 6 members. [Note: We opened a Shop at the Green Village Hall, but we can no longer use the hall and we need another venue.]

HANDS at Organic Shop: more regularly

Directory: a number of good suggestions some of which have been implemented and the rest will be considered.

Transactions: suggestions include more clarity on the transaction slip and publicise statistics on trades

Exchange Vouchers: overwhelmingly favourable

Website: desire for a full-feature interactive website, which we now have.

HANDShake: ideas to increase participation

Increasing awareness of/use of the system: encourage more trades and more people getting involved, more education, information on offerings and wants more easily available, ideas for higher profile,

Concerns: don't overregulate, bad debts, why it works for some and not others, need to keep the system strong through active trading, time bank system is fairer, one response suggesting maximum 500H limit with conditions for reactivation if reached.

Information to members: suggestions for more updates on offerings and how to publicise

Positive feedback about H.A.N.D.S.: email updates are handy, having a HANDy messenger is great, members are generally happy with the system and appreciate all the behind-the-scenes work being done.

MARKET NEWS

"HANDS"-on Autumn Market at The Nook 11-2, Sunday 26 March, raindate Sunday 2 April

The market will be held in the spacious Nook orchard, with three gazebos set up amongst the trees. Members Cathy & Dennis Sage, who are managers of The Nook and whose food business is Sage Preserves, will be preparing a couple of savoury dishes and baking some cakes. There's plenty of scope for other food stalls as well. This will be a HANDS-on market where we'll have the opportunity to "give a go" to some of the many skills of our members. Browsing the H.A.N.D.S. directory reveals limitless possibilities. We're hoping to have a variety of skills or information workshops, for example, art, crafts, music, photography, dance, movement, qi gong, intro to feng shui, aromatherapy, or permaculture, pest control. We intend to organise a schedule of workshops of varying lengths (about half an hour to an hour) throughout the duration of the market, free to HANDS members, with only one happening at any one time. Members who offer workshops will be paid by the committee in HANDS (negotiable). We also intend to advertise the market and workshops to the general public. Non-members who participate in a workshop will buy HANDS Exchange Vouchers and pay workshop leaders in HANDS.

In keeping with the HANDS-on theme, we're also asking that as many members as possible offer consultations, sessions, etc (such as health therapies, energy work, dream interpretation, haircuts) for HANDS at their own stalls. Remember, stallholders pay no quarterly fee. :-)
There will be some gazebo space available for members' use. Please let Joanna know ASAP if you can give a workshop so she can plan a roster.

Silent Auction of Neil Baker wooden head: A former member who has left Golden Bay is giving up his prize Neil Baker wooden head to bring his HANDS debit back to zero. We're going to auction it by "silent auction" (a sheet for bids, with the highest bidder taking it away).

Second charitable raffle: A raffle prize has already been donated. Please contact a committee member to nominate someone to have some work done.

Live music will feature at the market as well.

The Nook is at 678 Abel Tasman Drive, Pohara (from Takaka, it's past the Clifton turnoff, on the right). Stallholders can park at the end of the drive, in the paddock by the housetruck and walk to the orchard. Shoppers, please park on the verge on the Nook side.

*Ads can be "wants" or "offers." Unless updated, wants remain on the site for 30 days and offers for a year. When you update your ad, it goes back to the top of the list and is more visible to anyone viewing them.

The first "charitable raffle" was a success. Fi was happy to win the large homebaked holiday fruitcake baked and donated by Lynn. A nominated member was selected to win work paid for with the HANDS raised from sale of raffle tickets.

HANDS - a complementary mutual credit currency

H.A.N.D.S. is the Golden Bay version of LETS, a Local Employment & Trading System, one of nine in New Zealand. Our H.A.N.D.S. brochure describes HANDS, our Green Dollar currency, as a "complementary mutual credit currency." What does that exactly mean? Complementary means that HANDS currency coexists locally with the Kiwi \$ and the existing economic system. Mutual credit means that it's agreed on by both parties and we are all in it together. Currency is an exchange medium. The value of LETS is in the mutual community of members and their commitment to each other and the system. The backing or the value of a LETS credit lies in the commitment of each member to honour LETS credits as payment. A LETS is a self-contained economic cycle, and the real value of a Green Dollar is entirely influenced by what happens within this cycle.

Michael Linton, who organised the first LETS in 1982, in Comox Valley, western Canada, once asked the question, "When you wake up in the morning, do you breath in or out first?" It doesn't matter with which we start, but we need to do both in equal amounts to survive. The same with LETS – it doesn't matter if any individual is in debit

H.A.N.D.S. reach out to the community

The Onetahua marae in Pohara Valley received as a donation H.A.N.D.S. Exchange Vouchers totalling 40 HANDS. A marae committee member contacted Murray, saying they'd like to use the HANDS for gardening work at the marae. Joanna organised five people to work together in a short but intense burst, giving one of the gardens a makeover and sharing the 40 HANDS.

This was the marae's first experience with H.A.N.D.S. It was only possible because of our new Exchange Vouchers, and it shows that this sort of awareness raising, practical, H.A.N.D.S.-strengthening connection can happen with any local organisation.

H.A.N.D.S. has joined LETS Connect NZ

LETS Connect is similar to any local LETS (Local Employment & Trading System) exchange, except the members are LETS exchanges instead of individuals. LETS Connect is designed to allow intertrading between members of the groups and cater for traveling members, as well as allow trading at national conferences and regional meetings and allow the transfer of an account balance from one group to another when a member moves to a new area. A newsletter provides updates on the various exchanges and other related information. The LETS Connect website is at <http://www.letsnewzealand.org.nz/>. LETS Connect is overseen by a committee, originally set up by a national conference and answerable to the annual national conference. The AGM is held during each conference, when committee positions are open for election. Christoph Hensch is the current chair. H.A.N.D.S., the largest LETS in NZ, will now be able to have a voice at the AGM. In the past, H.A.N.D.S. members could

As a member of LETS Connect, we can now trade with members of 11 other exchanges throughout New Zealand. Contact details are on p. 7. Many of them also use the <http://www.ces.org.za/> website that we're using, and the software is set up that we can intertrade directly with all other NZ exchanges. Their member lists and offerings can be viewed on line, contacts made, and trades recorded. Other trades can occur when our members visit an area with a LETS exchange.

Golden Bay Resource Exchange

H.A.N.D.S. is a successful Local Employment & Trading System. By issuing Exchange Vouchers, H.A.N.D.S. has expanded its potential reach to the wider Golden Bay community. Thanks to the H.A.N.D.S. committee for increasing the trading range of our local system.

Last issue, I wrote about complementing H.A.N.D.S. with a Time Bank. H.A.N.D.S. is designed to encourage ongoing trades with members' goal to move their balances back and forth through a zero balance. Time Banking would complement ongoing trading by providing an opportunity to "save" and use the collateral for individual and community ventures.

I also suggest that a Community Resource Exchange be considered as an intermediate community reserve for our locally produced and distributed resources. A Resource Exchange and Time Bank would require a study group to form to research their viability and investigate how H.A.N.D.S., Time Banking and a Community Resource Exchange can work together for a cooperative, sustainable local economy.

EXCHANGE VOUCHERS (EVs)

There are now four ways to trade in HANDS: transaction slips, online, contact the HANDy messenger, and directly using EVs. 3217 HANDS of our new EVs were in circulation as at 14 February. This is the only trading method that's not trackable. Prior to EVs the Committee was aware of every trade, except at markets. The Committee would very much like to know how much members are trading with EVs, and we'd appreciate some feedback. Please talk to a Committee member about your use of the EVs.

How EVs work: Exchange vouchers obtained from H.A.N.D.S. admin are debited from the member's account. EVs returned to HANDS admin will be credited to the member's account. These can best be done at a market or during office hours. Credit & debit limits continue to apply. Trading with EVs is not also recorded within the system. Anyone can use EVs, but only members can withdraw and credit them against their accounts.

The Committee also suggests that, to introduce the concept of a complementary local currency to more people in our community, wherever you're shopping in Golden Bay, you show the EVs you have in your wallet or pocket at point of sale and say a few words about them and our GB H.A.N.D.S. system.

Markets & Newsletters

H.A.N.D.S. markets are held quarterly, in March, June, September and December, around the time of each equinox and solstice. H.A.N.D.S. newsletters are also quarterly, distributed one to two weeks before each market.

ACCOUNTS ON HOLD

Accounts of members who will be away from Golden Bay for a short period of time, up to a year, can be put on hold. This means the membership is informed and no quarterly fee is deducted.

CLOSING ACCOUNTS

Members join with a 0 HANDS balance in their account; if they leave, they are expected to bring their HANDS balance back to zero. Members in credit wishing to leave H.A.N.D.S. may spend their HANDS or donate them to another member or to the system. Those in debit need to earn HANDS, provide goods acceptable to the Committee to be sold on their behalf, and/or pay NZ dollars, to restore their balance to zero.
